The Son of Man came


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- The Son of Man came to seek and to save that which was lost...

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

Four Observations:

1. Jesus' **saw** Levi.

²⁷After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector by the name of Levi sitting at his tax booth. "Follow me," Jesus said to him, ²⁸and Levi got up, left everything and followed him.

What does it mean to "see" someone, in the way that Jesus' saw Levi?

See = Eido in the Greek; two meanings:

- 1. To have eyesight or functioning vision
- To notice, to see with insight and understanding

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Many of us miss "seeing" the person in front of us.



Failing to give focused attention is failing to see.

Four Observations:

Jesus invited Levi to follow him.





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- Levi was NOT a practicing Jew.
- Levi was very wealthy.
- Levi was viewed as living an immoral lifestyle.

Four Observations:

Levi's response: He left everything and followed Jesus.

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²⁷After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector by the name of Levi sitting at his tax booth. "Follow me," Jesus said to him, ²⁸and Levi got up, left everything and followed him.

Luke 5:27-28 (NIV)

Unlike Simon and Andrew who could return to their fishing business, Levi's decision was irreversible.

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Levi gave up the most, financially, to follow Jesus.

Four Observations:

4. What Levi did next tells us a great deal about his heart and generosity. He hosts a dinner.

Levi could have left his job and life quietly and hoped that his tax collecting friends might one day meet Jesus.

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Levi did the one thing he knew to connect them with Jesus. He invited them to his house for a meal.

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When asked about the one key to bringing people far from God near to Him, I simply say, 'Start throwing great dinner parties.'



1. Levi took the initiative so that his friends could meet Jesus.

2. Things were going well until the Pharisees showed up.

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What do we learn from Jesus' meal with Levi?

 Jesus' method of calling sinners to repentance often involved eating with them first.

"Frisco First is a community of believers that invite people into relationship with Jesus and each other."

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Often the relationship comes first.
